

Bufferd Child Emotion Lab: Application for Research Assistants

- We are seeking research assistants (RAs) for studies in my lab in which we study the development of mood and anxiety difficulties in children.
- Tasks may include (but are not limited to) participant recruitment and enrollment, data management (e.g., monitoring electronic data collection), assessments with children and their families on emotional, behavioral, and cognitive functioning, behavioral coding, data entry and cleaning, literature searches, and lab meetings.
- Participation in the lab requires a minimum commitment of 10 hours per week. Some early morning, evening, and weekend hours may be required.
- We need RAs who are available for at least one calendar year (e.g., June through the following May)
- If the experience is mutually beneficial, students may choose to stay longer (many do).
- Applicants with the following qualities will be given the highest consideration: interested in work with children and families, detail-oriented, highly responsible, communicative, motivated, mature, and works well individually and in groups. In addition, applicants must be able to feasibly fit lab activities into their schedule and manage the commitment on top of academic and other responsibilities.
